



The conference, called Jewels of Nature, celebrated the 200th anniversary of the birth of Fredrick Law Olmstead and focused on his influence on parks in the area.

Speakers for the conference were Dr. William (Ned) Friedman, Director of the Arnold Arboretum of Harvard University and Ulrich (Uli) Lorimer, Director of Horticulture for Native Plant



Trust. 225 delegates gathered

from all over the United States and Canada and experienced first hand the beautiful properties of Massachusetts Horticultural Society's Gardens at Elm Bank, the Native Plant Trust's Garden in the Woods and Harvard University's Arnold Arboretum. There were many different opportunities to dig deep in learning throughout the two day conference. Frederick Olmstead himself even made an appearance at the evening program, time traveling all the way from the late 1800s to share his inspiration!

The educational component was only a portion of what was gained from such a fun experience. There was lots of networking, sharing ideas from other clubs and a seed share as well. Many seed packs were picked up and will be available to LGC members at the November meeting. Our own Ruthie Taylor also attended the conference as a volunteer. It was a wonderful experience for all and the delegates look forward to sharing some of the things they learned in the coming months!
