Greetings from your Conservation chairs, Abbie Williams and Ragan Magness. We are excited about kicking off this Little Garden Club year by enlightening you (and us!) about conservation opportunities in our community and how they can have an impact on our homes, our city and yes, our



world! This year we would like to focus on the Wolf River Conservancy right here in Memphis – what is its mission, how we can get involved, who do we know on the board (a-hem, Kirk), and what is the Conservancy doing to better our Memphis community for today and for our children and grandchildren?

Here is a little taste of the WRC. They are dedicated to the protection and enhancement of the Wolf River and its Watershed as a sustainable natural resource. What is that and why does this matter to us? Well, as we are going to learn together this year, the Wolf River watershed plays a vital roll in our quality of life here in Memphis. Through the WRC, we want to introduce to you opportunities to serve, opportunities to explore (socially distanced Ghost River Tour perhaps?), and opportunities to make SMALL and reasonable changes in your life that really do have an impact on our world. It's going to be a great year!

Speaking of great, we just learned that through bipartisan (what???) support the House and Senate passed the Great American Outdoors Act and President Trump tweeted that he would sign it into law as soon as it comes across his desk. This act is the biggest land conservation legislation in a generation and is being hailed as a conservationist's dream bill. It fully and permanently allocates funds to the National Parks to address the backlogs of infrastructure repairs desperately needed within our park system. This has been an issue addressed at NAL for many years and it is exciting to see it come to pass. This is truly a great day for the next generation of National Park lovers!

Wolf River Conservancy Director of Education Receives GCA Elizabeth Abernathy Hull Award



As I was perusing the awards section of the summer GCA Bulletin, a photo caught my eye and a familiar name popped off the page. It was our own Cathy Justis, the Wolf River Conservancy's Director of Education! She was one of nine recipients of the Elizabeth Abernathy Hull Award which recognizes individuals who work with children under 16 to inspire "their appreciation of the beauty and fragility of our planet." Cathy was proposed by Roberta Anderson of the Memphis Garden Club. Here is what the Bulletin has to say about Cathy:

Cathy Justis is the Director of Education for the Wolf River Conservancy in Memphis, Tennessee. With an emphasis on water education, she provides a wide range of programming for K–12 students and others, including frog chorus walks, stream strolls, and service projects. Her activities are designed to provide Memphis and Shelby County youth with a greater appreciation of the natural environment, especially a better understanding of the source of clean drinking water. She is frequently invited by local educators to participate directly in the classroom teaching of environmental education. Complementing her direct involvement with children, Justis also is certified to teach "Project WET" workshops, designed to provide educators at all levels with information on diverse water topics so that they can reach children with objective, science-based water educators with Project WET.

The staff and board of the WRC are so happy for Cathy to receive this well-deserved recognition. Her enthusiasm and sense of wonder are infectious as she works with children and youth in Memphis who might not otherwise have experiences outside in the natural world.

Congratulations, Cathy!
